The meeting was called to order at 5:02pm.

1) Approval of Minutes – December 2, 2021

The minutes of December 2, 2021 were approved by consensus.

2) Review and discussion of Final Rule from U.S. Treasury

Ms. Meriwether provided an overview of the final rule, which provided more detailed explanation and definitions regarding the categories for eligible use. Ms. Meriwether noted that there is an increase in the flexibility now permitted under the "revenue loss" category as it pertains to the use of funds for general government services.

The group discussed the parameters around the use of funds for general government services as compared to capital expenditures. Ms. Meriwether noted that we will be seeking clarification on what types of smaller capital and maintenance expenditures qualify, and whether we can use the funds to supplant regular budget items. The group briefly discussed the need to allocate funds for immediate relief, while also coming up with a comprehensive plan for all of the funds.

3) Discussion of process and potential uses for ARPA funds

a. Public hearing feedback

Ms. Mackstutis provided an overview of the feedback received from the public at the January 24 Board of Selectmen meeting.

b. Proposed projects/categories

The group reviewed and discussed the draft list of projects. The work group members requested that additional fields be presented to show the total annual cost for each project, where the project idea originated, and what the priority level is.

c. Non-profit application – recommendation for BOS

The work group agreed by consensus to advance this project to the Board of Selectmen for consideration.

Police Service Dog

A police service dog will greatly enhance the effectiveness and relationship between the police department and the community. A service dog will complement the existing roles, responsibilities and tasks of the police department by:

- Quickly removing social barriers and creating opportunities for positive engagement,
- Providing comfort to victims and witnesses,
- Encouraging cooperation, compliance and participation,
- Supporting social emotional needs of the community and department members,
- Reducing stress, and
- Assisting during or after a crisis.

The service dog will be assigned to an officer who regularly attends community based events; social, crime

prevention and other informative meetings with individuals and groups in single family homes and commercial residential settings, businesses, the library, public and private schools and other public settings. The team will be able to respond to crises, provide assistance with patrol functions and investigations.

The service dog will not provide traditional police patrol support. It will not be trained to search for contraband or hazards, track or locate people, or confront or contain suspects. The dog will have extensive training to provide comfort and emotional support with a relaxing and welcoming demeanor.

The dog may spend significant time in a police vehicle, so it is imperative that the vehicle assigned to the handler is equipped with emergency, safety and comfort measures for both the officer and the dog. These measures are beyond that of a normal patrol vehicle and may include:

- Heat/temperature alarm
- Platform and cage area
- Automatic window fan

Ordinarily, patrol vehicles are pulled out of service prior to end of normal patrol service life and reassigned to positions that do not require such extensive use (engine hours and mileage). The reassigned vehicles normally last a couple more years after reassignment, before they need to be replaced again. If this process continued for a service dog vehicle, it will be costly to transfer the dog specific equipment from one vehicle to another (est. over \$1,000 for each transfer) and two cars would be out of service during that transfer.

A one-time (life of the dog) purchase of a new marked cruiser with equipment seems to be the most logical approach. The estimated cost of a new fully equipped police cruiser (marked cruiser with emergency lights, MDT, dash-cameras, dog specific emergency, safety and comfort equipment, etc. installation) is \$66-70,000.00.

The service dog will require care and maintenance outside of a handler's work hours. The officer will be compensated for that time through a stipend. The details for the stipend have not been negotiated or agreed upon, but an estimated annual stipend has been provided.

RESOLUTION AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT PROGRAM FUNDING

WHEREAS, the Town of Simsbury is in receipt of funding from American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA"); and

WHEREAS, the intent of the funding is to assist the Town in meeting immediate pandemic needs and to promote long-term recovery from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on June 15, 2021 the Simsbury Board of Finance established a Special Revenue Fund for the receipt and expenditure of ARPA funds; and

WHEREAS, on January 1, 2022 the United States Department of the Treasury published its Final Rule for the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds ("SLFRF") program regarding the municipal expenditure of ARPA funds, and

WHEREAS, on January 24, 2022 the Board of Selectmen held a public hearing to solicit comments and recommendations for the expenditures of SLFRF Program funds; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Selectmen finds that SLFRF Program funding to support the following programs in the amount listed herein is consistent with the ARPA Final Rule and will assist the Town in its long-term recovery from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. Pursuant to Section 809 of the Town Charter, the Board of Selectmen recommends the following appropriations from the ARPA Special Revenue Fund for the expenditure of SLFRF Program funding to be used on COVID recovery programs, services, projects, and purchases such as but not limited to:
 - Public health recovery
 - Business recovery
 - Non-profit recovery
 - Student educational recovery and literacy efforts
 - Mental health and well-being recovery
 - Diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives
 - Capital projects that support air-quality and HVAC systems in town-owned facilities
 - Capital projects and purchases that support town-owned outdoor infrastructure such as parks, playgrounds, trails, open spaces, and other outdoor amenities
 - Other categories or items as may be determined by the Board at a later date
