Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day is April 30

he Town of Simsbury, in conjunction with the Towns of Avon, Canton, Granby, and Farmington will be holding a Household Hazardous Waste collection on Saturday, April 30, 2016 at Farmington High School, 10 Monteith Drive, Farmington, CT.

The collection will run from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. and will be open to all residents from Simsbury, Avon, Canton, Granby, and Farmington.

There will be two other collection dates this year that town residents can attend:

- June 18, 2016: Simsbury Public Works Facility, 66 Town Forest Road, Simsbury, CT.
- November 5, 2016: Simsbury Public Works Facility, 66 Town Forest Road, Simsbury, CT.

For this first collection, Farmington is also offering free to residents of the participating towns:

- Electronic recycling drop-off at Farmington Town Hall parking lot, 1 Monteith Drive, and
- Used motor oil collection

Below are some frequently asked questions related to Household

Hazardous Waste disposal. For more specific information, please contact

Acceptable items:

• Fluorescent and compact

light bulbs

- Batteries common household batteries including rechargeable batteries and car batteries
- Lawn care chemicals fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides, fungicides
- Switches or items containing Mercury — thermometers, thermostats, motion detectors
- Household cleaners —
 acids, adhesives, aerosol cans,
 ammonia, drain cleaner,
 disinfectants, moth balls, etc.
- Chemicals from the garage or workshop — antifreeze, ant/bug spray or bait, brake fluid, old gasoline, oil based and latex paints, lighter fluid, polyurethane, pool chemicals, road flares, transmission fluid, power steering fluid, wood stain, etc.

Unacceptable items:

- Ammunition and/or explosives (including gunpowder)
- Asbestos
- Business waste (collection is for residential waste only)
- Cement
- Empty containers a container is considered empty when no more than one inch or 3 percent (by weight) of material is left in the container, these can be disposed of in the regular trash.
- Fire extinguishers



- Freon
- Marine flares pyrotechnic flares cannot be accepted at the collection because they are categorized as explosives.
- Ice melt ice melt is not hazardous and can be disposed in the regular trash.
- Latex driveway sealer (Genite)
 — driveway sealer is not hazardous; solidify then throw in the regular trash.
- Medicine/drugs/needles/ syringes
- Propane tanks for gas grills
- Appliances
- Smoke detectors
- Tires
- Used oil filters

To get rid of latex and oil-based paint, you can recycle it through PaintCare — it's free.

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Help Keep the Trails Clean on April 17

he Farmington Valley Trails
Council will hold its 7th annual
Trail-Wide Clean-Up Day on
Sunday, April 17 from 10 a.m. to 2
p.m. (The rain date is Sunday, April
24). Last year's event drew over 200
volunteers at four staging areas
across the eight towns in the Farmington Valley that encompass the
22.4 miles of the Farmington Canal
Heritage Trail and the 10.2 miles of
the Farmington River Trail.

These continuously paved miles from Farmington to Southwick, MA had over 11 cubic yards of trash removed. Volunteers will cover a specific 1-mile stretch of the trail starting from five staging areas:

- Brickyard Road in Farmington
- Iron Horse Blvd. in Simsbury
- The River Trail Pavilion at Rt. 4 in Unionville
- Copper Hill Road in Granby and
- Sperry Park in Avon

This early season run, bike, paddle event is an ideal way to kick off

your triathlon season. The event is open to both individuals and teams. The race is being organized by the Town of Simsbury and this year's new race director, Sharon

McHale. Thank you to Simsbury Bank, returning as our platinum sponsor. Simsbury Connecticut, the state's only Silver Bicycle Friendly Community, is located on the beautiful Farmington River and on the Farmington Canal Heritage Bike Trail that runs through the historic and scenic town center. Triathletes will experience Simsbury's exquisite biking, hiking and paddling routes as part of the event. The 5k

off-road trail run will showcase the recently refurbished River Walk Trail. The 12-mile road route, on back county roads and the bike trail, exemplify some of the best cycling in the state. Participants will finish with a 2-mile paddle on the Farmington River with views of the picturesque Old Drake Hill Flower

Bridge and will utilize the newly acquired riveraccess land. The bridge is an ideal location for spectators. Assistance moving kayaks in and out of the river will be provided by volunteers. Post-

Simsbury Free Bikes can be borrowed in the towns of Simsbury, Avon, Granby, Canton and Farmington. Riders must verify that they are at least 18 years old, sign a waiver and provide a refundable \$10 deposit. Riders receive a helmet and bike lock. Trail maps can be purchased for \$1 each and
