New bank opening on corner of Bushy Hill and Rte. 44

he Simsbury Zoning Commission has approved a new development (actually a redevelopment) of the property at the corner of Bushy Hill Road and Route 44, 16 Albany Turnpike.

The site was formerly occupied by a gas station, but that use was removed years ago after a fuel spill at the site. Since that

Protection (now the Department of
Energy and Environmental Protection) has worked diligently with the
property to clean the site.

The new use of the site is a small Berkshire Bank branch office. It is

important for residents to know that no new curb cuts were permitted as part of the zoning approval.

Only existing curb cuts will be permitted to be used. The

The site has also been reviewed and approved by the state Department of Transportation.

Simsbury retains Aaa rating from Moody's for bond sale

oody's Investors Service has reaffirmed the Town of Simsbury's Aaa bond rating — Moody's highest rating.

Moody's highest long-term rating reflects the town's affluent and moderately-sized tax base, which is favorably located outside of the state capital.

The Aaa rating further factors the town's professional management team, which has maintained historically stable finan-

cial operations and healthy reserve levels which are supported by a formal policy. Further, the rating incorporates modest long-term liabilities for debt service, pension, and OPEB.

"I'm pleased but not surprised. This is the result of a long-standing commitment to responsible fiscal management," said First Selectman Lisa Heavner. "We understand that the money we spend comes from our residents' pockets and work very hard to get it right."

"I am pleased that the town was able to MOODY'S INVESTORS SERVICE

maintain the Aaa bond rating," said Board of Finance Chairman Peter Askham. "This rating validates the town's policies of debt management, reserves, pension and OPEB funding. The town has been, and will always be, committed to sound conservative fiscal management."

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
Join the community discussion of Boys in the Boat with SHS crew team


The discussion, from 7 to 8:30 p.m., will be led by local historian and author, Mary Jane Springman.

"Having members of the crew team with us will add a special dimension to the




discussion of this captivating and inspiring true story," she said.

Survey says: residents give town high marks for quality of life




"We have worked hard as a community in the face of some very tough economic challenges to make sure that Simsbury remains a wonderful place to live and work," said First Selectman Lisa Heavner. "This survey validates priorities established by the board of selectmen, particularly in areas such as open space, the development of opportunities for outdoor activities such as biking and walking, and maintaining Simsbury's historic charm."

Selectman Sean Askham concurred, stating that "these results give us some good our efforts in the future."

According to the report, preservation of open space and areas dedicated to pedestrian use were top priorities for residents with 92.3 percent of residents viewing the town's activities in this area "very positively."

A number of the survey questions focused on the future of the town's senior center and the board of selectmen's directive to fully explore development of a senior/community center at the Simsbury Meadows Performing Arts Center site on Iron Horse Boulevard.

GreatBlue's "resident opinion study" concluded that "the location voted by the board of selectmen would not only retain current visitors ... but it would also attract new ones ..." Residents placed more importance on programming than on location, with a heavy focus on health, recreation and wellness activities availa-



Questions designed to obtain resident opinion on economic development, according to GreatBlue, showed that "residents, in general, were most in favor of modest development efforts that would aid commercial development while maintaining the town character." The section entitled "considerations" identified other opportunities, including improvement of the town's website and increased use of electronic communication as well as the possible development of a high-speed fiber optic network available to residents.



Lyme Disease Info

The deer tick is the primary carrier of Lyme disease in the northeast. Most humans are infected by nymphs (immature ticks). Currently there is no vaccination available.

Signs and symptoms of Lyme disease range from the 'bullseye' rash to fatigue, chills or fever, muscle or joint aches, or swollen lymph nodes. Other symptoms include Bell's palsy (loss of muscle tone on one or both sides of face), severe headaches, neck stiffness, swelling and painful large joints, and heart palpations and dizziness. Your physician can diagnosis Lyme

disease through blood tests. Treatment is normally a course of antibiotics directed by your physician. Preventing or reducing tick exposure is the best way to prevent Lyme disease. Wear long sleeves and pants tucked into socks, avoid wooded or bushy areas, or areas of high grass. Walk in the center of the trail. Use DEET or Permethrin as directed to repel ticks. Check for ticks after you've been outdoors.
