Electric vehicle (EV) charging station to be installed in the town hall parking lot

he Town of Simsbury was awarded a grant from the state Department of Energy and Environmental Protection to install one dual head electric vehicle charging station at Simsbury Town Hall.

Public works identified the first two spaces in the parking lot just as you enter from Hopmeadow Street to place the charging station. In the upcoming weeks, construction crews will be busy installing the necessary wiring to get the station up and running. This station will allow for the free charging of electric vehicles by both the public and town employees.

Once installed, please be considerate and only use the parking spaces if you are charging an electric vehicle.

The grant, for up to \$10,000, is under Connecticut's

Public Fleet EV and Public Workplace EV Charging Station Incentive Program.

The town has Simsbury's Director of Public Works Tom Roy and Simsbury's Clean Energy Task Force to thank for this successful initiative.

Taxes to the Town of Simsbury due; DMV tax bill issues

axes to the Town of Simsbury are due July 1, 2016 with the last day to pay as August 1, 2016. Taxes due at this time are:

- real estate
- motor vehicles
- business personal property Also due at this time are sewer use fees. Tax bills were mailed out on June 28, 2016.

DMV-Car issues

Due to all of the state Department of Motor Vehicle changes in the past year, the Simsbury Tax Department is asking you to please verify that you received all of your car bills. If you had a car registered on or before October 1, 2015 and did not receive a bill for that car, please contact the tax office at 860-658-3238.

If you registered a car after the October 1, 2015 date you should receive a bill in December of 2016. If you received a tax bill from Simsbury and you never lived in Simsbury, please contact the Simsbury Assessor's office at 860-658-3251 or if you received



a bill from another town and you never lived in that town please contact that town's assessor's office.

Police offer safety tips for pedestrians and bicyclists

Pedestrian Safety Tips

- Walk facing oncoming traffic.
- Wear bright clothing both day and night.
- Wear reflective material at dusk or dawn.
- Carry a flashlight when walking at night.
- Don't wear headphones, or talk on cell phones while crossing streets.
- Look left, right, then again when at crossings.

Bicyclist Safety Tips

- Ride in the same direction as motor vehicles.
- Wear bright clothing both day and night.
- Always wear a helmet.
- Use headlights, taillights and reflectors.
- Obey all traffic signs and signals.
- Follow the same rules as motorists and come to a complete stop at all stop signs and red light signals.
- Do not wear headphones when riding.

Safety tips for all: Carry some type of identification. In the event of an emergency, call 911. It is the goal of the Simsbury Police Department to help create a safer, more walkable and ridable community. Remember to make yourself visible to drivers and follow the law. 

Growing up in Connecticut — a CHS on the Road Program at Simsbury Public Library



rowing up in Connecticut, every generation faced challenges and opportunities and experienced the emotional highs and lows of childhood and adolescence.

But each generation also faced unique circumstances. This presentation, linked to the upcoming exhibition at the Connecticut Historical Society (CHS), will explore the issues that have faced Connecticut children and adolescents since the 1930s, focusing on four generations:

The Silent Generation (born

1928-1945)

- Baby Boomers (born 1946-1964)
- Generation X (born 1965-1980)
- Millennials (born 1981-1996)

The program will look at the larger issues that shaped the experiences of children and childhood in each period, but also how cultural ideas about children and childhood changed over time.
