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Try Simsbury Triathlon May 22

ooking for a little adventure? Mark your calendar for the third annual Try Simsbury Meadows and Mountain Adventure Triathlon. The event is scheduled for May 22, 2016 at 11 a.m.

The event is open to both individuals and teams. The race is being organized by the Town of Simsbury and this year's new race director, Sharon McHale.

Triathletes will experience Simsbury's exquisite biking, hiking and paddling routes as part of the event. The 5k off-road trail run will showcase the recently refurbished River Walk Trail. The 12-mile road route, on back county roads and the bike trail, exemplify some of the best cycling in the state. Participants will finish with a 2-mile paddle on the

Farmington River with views of the picturesque Old Drake Hill Flower Bridge and will utilize the newly acquired river-access land. The bridge is an ideal location for

spectators. Assistance moving kayaks in and out of the river will be provided by volunteers. Post-race festivities will be held at the Simsbury Performing Arts Center.

Race bags and numbers can be picked up on Saturday May 21 at the Red Stone Pub between 3 and 6 p.m. Race bags include generous discount coupons for use at local businesses so bring the family and

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Calling all Veterans — Simsbury announces plans for **Memorial Day parades**

imsbury's Memorial Day parades are attended by thousands of residents and visitors, with nearly 100 veterans marching or riding.

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This year's Memorial Day events will be held Monday, May 30. The parade and following ceremonies are great family events as they involve over a dozen bands, the police and fire department, town and state government representatives and nearly 100 veterans marching, many in uniform.

Coordinators are requesting that Veterans participate in the parades being held in Simsbury and Tariffville. "Every year the participation of Veterans gets larger and larger," said organizing chairman Bob Gauthier from the American Legion. This year marks the 99th anniversary of the parade and organizers want to increase Veteran participation to more than 100.

If not, please wear a hat designating branch of service or conflict. For the VFW and American Legion members please wear your cover.

The Tariffville parade takes place at 9 a.m., beginning at the foot of Winthrop Street and concluding at St. Bernard Cemetery. At the cemetery there will be a short ceremony with guest speakers. Veterans should muster at the foot of Winthrop Street at 8:30 a.m.

The Simsbury Parade begins at 1:30 p.m., stepping off from Owens Brook Blvd. and concluding at Eno Memori- Particulars such as shuttle bus al Hall. If you are unable to march, rides can be arranged.

Marchers should muster at 12:45 p.m. in the Simsbury Bank parking



lot. Riders should muster at the same time at 12:45 p.m. at Somerset Lane. Following the parade there will be a ceremony in front of Eno Memorial Hall, 754 Hopmeadow Street.
