Grants and Donations

Below is a listing of donations and grant applications approved by the Board of Selectmen at their meetings from May 24, 2021 – August 9, 2021:

- Public Library American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) Grant \$19,401 towards the purchase of a book bike that will be used to provide library services throughout the community and contactless pickup lockers. This funding has been received.
- Elinor and Wayne Hoffman Donation \$2,000 to provide emergency assistance (ie heat, food, shelter) to Simsbury residents in need
- Mark and Dianne Orenstein Donation \$1,765, of which, \$1,400 will be used to provide emergency assistance (ie heat, food, shelter) to Simsbury residents in need and the remaining \$365 to be used at the discretion of the department
- Trinity Episcopal Church Donation \$3,383.73 to assist with the purchase of food items for local families in
- University of Connecticut Donation \$9,000 value for two speed display signs
- Hartford Foundation for Public Giving Grant \$25,000 for the Social Services department to assist residents in need, if awarded
- Dial-A-Ride Vehicle Grant \$51,200 towards the purchase a new Dial-A-Ride vehicle
- Valley Simsbury Church Neighbor Group \$5,000 to assist with the purchase of food items for local families in need
- Youth Service Bureau Grant and Enhanced Grant \$24,857 for various programs, services, and activities for Simsbury youth and their families
- Simsbury Public Library Emergency Connectivity Fund Grant \$3,790 for 10 Wi-Fi hotspots which will be available for borrowing, if awarded

American Rescue Plan - Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds Update

The U.S. Department of Treasury announced the launch of the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds program that was authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act. This program provides \$350 billion in emergency funding for eligible state, local, territorial and Tribal governments to help address the economic fallout related to the pandemic, and layout the foundation for a strong and equitable recovery. Funding objections include:

- Supporting urgent COVID-19 response efforts to continue to decrease the spread of the virus and bring the pandemic under control
- Replace lost public sector revenue to strengthen support for vital public services and help retain jobs
- o Support immediate economic stabilization for households and businesses

 Address systemic public health economic challenges that have contributed to the inequal impact of the pandemic.

It was previously reported that the town was anticipated to receive \$2,507,322 in relief funding. Since this report, we have been notified that the town will be receiving an additional county allocation, bringing the town's total funding to \$7,515,665. The Board of Selectmen has formed a workgroup on how they would like to spend these funds. A brief presentation of the workgroup's conceptual framework and work to date was presented to the full Board of Selectmen at their regular meeting on August 9, 2021. One notable item of discussion is that the workgroup will be seeking feedback from various stakeholders including the Board of Finance. A planned presentation to the Board of Finance will be forthcoming within in the next few months.

LAP (Liability/Auto/Property) Insurance Member's Equity Distribution

Due to favorable LAP and worker's compensation claims experience, along with CIRMA's financial strength, the Town and Board of Education have received a member equity distribution in the amount of \$57,471 from CIRMA, our insurance provider, for these policies. This distribution exceeds budgetary estimates of \$27,500 by \$29,971.

Fleet Purchase and Capital Project Delays

Various contractors are experiencing material shortages from global manufacturing shutdowns and labor shortages due to impacts of the pandemic. This has translated locally as the Town is seeing a delay in the completion of various capital projects and material purchases as well as increased costs. Our fleet purchases have also been impacted. Along with an increased demand for new vehicles there is a global microchip shortage. Vehicle purchases have been delayed by several months. At present, there has been no budgetary impact but we will continue to monitor going forward.

TOWN OF SIMSBURY POLICY FOR BUDGETARY TRANSFERS AND SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS

Adopted by the Board of Finance on August xx, 2021

<u>Objective</u>: It is the purpose of this policy to outline the process and circumstances for amending the budget via supplemental appropriation or transfers within and between departments.

A. <u>Transfers within a Department – Use of Current Year Savings</u> The Board of Selectmen has the sole power to approve transfers within Town department budgets with the exception of the Board of Education.

For transfers within a department budget, contro's paintained at the departmental level and can happen any time during the year. In no case may the total expenditures of a particular department exceed that which is appropriated for the department as a whole.

The Board of Education has the sole power to approve transfers within the Board of Education budget so long as it and appropriation allocated to the Board of Education.

The Board of Finance rives no approntransfers within departments so long as the total expendituring a prointer department does not exceed that which is appropriated for the will department. The Board of Finance annually reviews transfers marily will departments at the close of the fiscal year pursuant to CGS Chapt 106, Sec. 345.

B. Transfers Betwarn Decurrents - Use of Current Year Savings

Pursuant to Sims. , Town Charter, Section 812 (f), upon the request of the Board of Selectmen during the last six (6) months of the fiscal year, the Board of Finance may, by vote, transfer any unencumbered appropriation, balance or portion thereof from one (1) department, commission, board or office to another. This provision shall not apply to the Board of Education.

Such transfers may be granted provided that:

- the purpose for which the transferred funds are to be expended remains unchanged; or
- the purpose for which the funds were initially appropriated no longer exists;
 or

• the proposed transfer is from a fund in which the amount appropriated exceeds the amount needed to accomplish the purpose specified in the appropriation approved at referendum.

C. Transfers Between Funds

All transfers between funds require the approval of the Board of Finance upon the request of the Board of Selectmen.

D. Supplemental Appropriations

No expenditure and no commitment to make an expenditure shall be made, caused to be made, or authorized by any officer, agency or agency of the Town, or by any board of commission of the Town unless an appropriation shall have been made covering such expenditure or commitment in accordance with the provisions of the Town Charter and state law (Charter Section 812(d)).

The Board of Finance shall have the power, by resolution and only upon the recommendation of a majority of the Board of Selectmen, a make any appropriation supplemental to those provided in the annual budget for the then current fiscal year. Except as set forth in sortion 810 (Emergency Appropriations), any individual appropriation for any purpose made equal to or greater than two percent (2%) of the small businet for the then current fiscal year is subject to automatic referendum out on the Section 406 of the Charter. Any individual appropriation for any surpose less than two percent (2%) of that annual budget for the sien current fiscal year may be made upon approval of the Board of Selectmen and the standard of Finance. Supplemental appropriations as described in this section of three percent (3%) of the annual budget for the then fiscal year a continuative tool of three percent (3%) of the annual budget for the then fiscal year. (Chart Section 809)

All budget increases a' ove the budget approved at referendum must be recommended by "a Board of Selectmen and approved by the Board of Finance. Common supplemental appropriations include, but are not limited to:

- Fiscal Year End Transfers: usually adopted in September/October to reappropriate funds from the previous year's ending balance for projects or obligations that were approved but not completed during the year or to fund a new project.
- Grants or unanticipated revenues: if revenue is received during the fiscal
 year from a source that was not anticipated at the time of budget
 adoption or appropriation for the fiscal year, such as grants or
 implementation of a new fee, the Board of Finance, upon
 recommendation of the Board of Selectmen, may appropriate that
 unanticipated revenue for expenditure when received anytime during the

- year. It is the practice of the Board of Finance that known or anticipated recurring grants be budgeted during the regular budget cycle.
- Emergency appropriations: For the purpose of meeting a public emergency threatening the lives, health or property of citizens, emergency appropriations, the total amount of which shall not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the undesignated fund balance for the then current fiscal year, may be made upon the recommendation of at least four (4) members of the Board of Selectmen and by an affirmative vote of no fewer than four (4) members of the Board of Finance. In the absence of sufficient general fund resources to meet such appropriations, additional means of financing shall be provided in such manner, consistent with the provisions of the General Statutes and of this Charter, as may be determined by the Board of Finance. (Charter, Section 810)

Supplemental appropriations for special projects 'continues shall be kept to a minimum when feasible via utilization of the annual bun teting process, year-end close out process or during the mid-year firencial review.

Supplemental appropriations for necessar, recurs and maintenance will be approved during the mid-year financial reviewor year-end close out. However, the Board of Finance will be notify a combe interview purchases in their monthly meeting in advance of the purchase

E. Appropriation Lapses

All appropriations up spend in the incumbered at the end of the fiscal year shall lapse to the applical ageneral fund, except for:

- Capit expenditure opropriations from whatever source derived, shall not apse until e purpose for which the appropriation was made shall have een accorplished or abandoned, provided any such project shall be deened to fave been abandoned if three (3) fiscal years shall lapse without an expenditure from or encumbrances of the appropriation therefore; and
- Federal or state grants do not lapse until the expiration of the federal or state grant or as required by law or
- Special Revenue Funds, unless explicitly stated as part of the creation of the fund.

PRESENT: Lisa Heavner, Arthur House, Robert Pomeroy, and Kevin Prell.

ALSO PRESENT:

Melissa Appleby, Deputy Town Manager, and Amy Meriwether, Director of Finance.

1. Call to Order - Establish Quorum

Ms. Heavner called the meeting to order at 5:49 P.M.

2. Pledge of Allegiance

All present stood for the Pledge of Allegiance.

Ms. Heavner noted that Chairman Pomeroy was participating by phone and had asked her to Chair the meeting.

3. Simsbury Public Schools Lighting Upgrade Loan Agreements

Ms. Heavner with the Simsbury Public Schools Lighting Upgrade Loan Agreements stating that the Board of Finance is being asked to authorize the Finance Director, Amy Meriwether, to execute the multi-year appropriation agreements with Eversource for each of the three lighting upgrade projects as presented. Ms. Meriwether spoke about the project and said the Board of Education will be doing energy efficiency lighting upgrades at Simsbury High School, Tootin' Hills Elementary School, and Squadron Line Elementary School. She stated the cost for the upgrades will be paid for by the savings generated by these upgrades. She added the Connecticut Energy Efficiency Fund program is an interest free loan over a five- year period. There is no upfront cost for the Town, and the cost of the upgrade is paid through the savings on the monthly electric bills from Eversource.

MOTION: Mr. Prell made a motion, effective July 20, 2021, to authorize Finance Director, Amy Meriwether, to execute the agreements with Eversource for each of the three lighting upgrade projects as presented. Mr. House second the motion. All were in favor, and the motion carried unanimously.

4. State Department of Agriculture Funds for Meadowood Acquisition Supplemental Appropriation

Ms. Heavner mentioned that during the budget process they were presented with the Meadwood Project, which was in part, to be funded by grants. The Trust for Public Land was the applicant for the funds, but the grant funds are being received directly to the Town of Simsbury. A supplemental appropriation of \$877,500 is now required to appropriate the grant funds. This grant funding does not affect the Town's planned financial contribution to the acquisition.

MOTION: Mr. House made a motion, effective July 20, 2021, to approve the supplemental appropriation request for the Meadowood acquisition as presented. Mr. Prell second the motion. All were in favor, and the motion carried unanimously.

5. Approval of Minutes - June 15, 2021

The minutes from the June 15th Regular Meeting were approved as submitted.

6. Communications

Ms. Heavner spoke about the recent news report where CCM is pushing towns in CT to look for alternate sources of revenue. The report mentioned that property tax was heavily relied on, about 98%, and in many other communities the average is 72%. Ms. Heavner stated that if this change goes through it will require the Town to have more reserves. She said Moody's commented that Connecticut towns' reserves are lower than the national average because the property tax is relied on so heavily and that is considered a more stable revenue source. Ms. Meriwether added that the annual report sent out by Moody's is for accuracy review only and the town does not get to participate in the report content. She mentioned there was nothing in the report that was alarming, and it was standard in conjunction with what the bond advisor had presented on.

7. Adjourn

MOTION: Mr. House made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 5:56 P.M. Mr. Prell seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion passed unanimously.
