Open Space Stewardship & Policies Work Group Wednesday, February 7, 2024 4:30 PM- Via Zoom SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES

PRESENT: Margery Winters, Karyn Cordner, and Helen Peterson, Wendy Mackstutis

ALSO PRESENT: Tom Tyburski, Director of Culture, Parks and Recreation was also in attendance.

Call to Order

Ms. Winters called the meeting to order at 4:30 PM.

- 1. Discussion of Educational Programs Ms. Winters shared that she has been working with Simsbury Pollinator Pathways regarding a series of talks they will be hosting this spring (co-sponsored by Simsbury Land Trust and the Conservation Commission). She also hoped that Open Space would co-sponsor. The series will begin 3/12. The topics include pollinators, dark skies, invasives, beyond birdfeeders and one that is yet to be determined.
- 2. Discussion of Invasive Plant Removal Days- Ms. Winters shared that Simsbury Land Trust is having a series of invasive plant removal days on their property. She inquired as to how to potentially set one up on Town property. Mr. Tyburski shared that ideally people would sign up for a brief training session. If herbicide is involved, assuming they wouldn't be working near any wetlands, he doesn't believe any permitting would be involved. Ms. Winters shared that Simsbury Land Trust is working on putting together a brochure regarding the 10 most problematic invasives species in Town (they are looking for grant money). Mr. Tyburski shared that an information session followed by a volunteer sign up would be ideal. Ms. Winters also shared that scouts are always looking for a conservation project. Ms. Peterson suggested sharing at the BOS public audience. Ms. Mackstutis shared she could also include in the First Selectmen's report.
- 3. Agricultural Policy and the Community Farm -Ms. Mackstutis shared that the current contract is ending for the farm and they are looking for someone to come in there more long term. They are looking at a gentleman (from Flamig's compost business) coming in and having a farm manager there, they are working on putting together a proposal and have Open Space approve it before sending to BOS.
- 4. Proposed Developments and the Role of Open Space Committee Mr. Tyburski shared regarding the proposed developments at The Hartford old space. He commented that since it is not on open space, unless solicited as a whole, and asked to weigh in then it doesn't fall within the group's role to provide feedback. Although, everyone individually can feel free to attend meetings and public hearings, etc.
- **5. Budget Update** Mr. Tyburski shared that he had a chance to discuss the three service improvements with the new Town Manager. As of that meeting, two of the three are being considered, the invasive and ecological evaluation and remediation plan and the


invasive plant and ecological booklet. He shared that one conflict is that the Land Trust also submitted a grant request for basically the same thing. The town manager will present his budget to the board of selectmen on February 26th.


STILLBROOK OPEN SPACE



STILLBROOK OPEN SPACE

The town-owned Still Brook Open Space consists of 47.5 acres of mixed coniferous and deciduous forest between Stratton Brook and Sand Hill Roads, and contains about 1.1 miles of a seasonal stream called Still Brook.

The 2.5 miles of trails provide a variety of walking experiences and surfaces. All of the trails as they leave the streets are paved for varying distances with stone dust or asphalt, then continue as unimproved trails. The open space is generally lower than the surrounding neighborhoods, with steeper paths on entering which level out as they parallel the brook. Despite their close proximity to the residential neighborhoods, the trails are refreshingly quiet and private. There are six wooden footbridges across Still Brook and three boardwalks where the trail traverses wet terrain. Bordering the brook visitors can see distinct belts of vegetation. The belt of skunk cabbage edges the stream with a belt of cinnamon fern above it. The wetland also contains a variety of tall grasses. This area is home to deer, raccoons, chipmunks, and grouse.

Subject: Katherine-Windham Easement

I am writing to detail the need for Aquarion's infrastructure (water main) to share the town's sewer easement between Katherine Lane and Windham Drive in Simsbury. As you may be aware we are building a new pump station facility on Aquarion's property located at 29 Clifdon Dr. Our intent is for this facility to replace multiple aging pumping facilities in the immediate area. In doing so we will also resolve ongoing system pressure issues, improve fire flows, and increase the dependability of the system for the Windham-Scarborough-Clifdon neighborhoods.

Over the past several years the underground infrastructure in the area has been upgraded and prepared for this, the culmination of years of effort. The underground infrastructure planned for this easement is the final piece which, when the new station goes online, will allow the community to experience the full effect of our efforts to improve water service and fire safety.

To execute this work our contractor will clear roughly 85 trees, grind and remove stumps, and install a water main through the easement. Once the main passes our QA/QC process the contractor will install loam and seed the area of disturbance. Our contractor has estimated 5 weeks to complete this work. Aquarion's senior leadership has approved funding to execute this project and the property owners at #10 Katherine Lane have agreed to grant Aquarion an easement through their property. Future maintenance for this infrastructure would include vegetation clearing like the town's current activities maintaining the sewer easement. No other routine maintenance is expected to be necessary.
