On November 8th, residents will have the opportunity to vote on proposed Simsbury Town Charter Changes which include: changing the form of government to Town Manager, changes to provisions governing the Economic Development Commission, the elimination of the Human Relations Commission, the expansion of membership to the Open Space Committee, changes to the Town budget and appropriations process, and incorporating gender neutral language into the Charter. Simsbury Receives Main Street Investment Fund Grant of \$460,760 for “Streetscape” Improvements

The Town of Simsbury has received a Main Street Investment Fund grant from the Connecticut Department of Housing in the amount of \$460,760 for improvements in the town center including the installation of paver sidewalks, ornamental pedestrian lighting and Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant sidewalk ramps. The streetscape project is part of a larger and more comprehensive plan of developing “Complete Streets” which ensure streets are safe for people of all ages and abilities and support the local economy and the natural environment. Thanks to Housing Commissioner Evonne Klein, the Board of Selectmen, Senator Witkos and Representative Hampton for supporting this project, as well as Town staff and Main Street Partnership for their work in preparing and submitting the application.

Simsbury Ranked in the Top 20 Safest Cities in Connecticut

The SafeWise Report has released its 2016 Safest Cities in Connecticut and Simsbury is ranked the 11th safest city in Connecticut, and top in the Farmington Valley. To identify the 20 safest cities in Connecticut, SafeWise reviewed the most recent FBI Crime Report statistics along with population data. Simsbury takes a Community Policing approach to law enforcement and has received national accreditation from CALEA for their excellence.

Conservation Commission – Seeing Red

Part of the Conservation Commission’s responsibility is to preserve the natural resources of the Town. One issue facing Simsbury and the entire state is the increasing number of invasive plants that overtake native plants. Now is the time of year we admire those beautiful red burning bushes that bring so much visual pleasure to our home landscapes. But did you know they are actually invasive plants that are wreaking havoc in our woods – *sadly true!*

After feasting on the berries of this invasive, non-native bush, birds deposit these berries in their droppings in local woodlands. There, burning bushes create dense thickets that dominate the landscape, replacing native plants. The Conservation Commission recommends residents consider removing these plants from yards and replacing them with native shrubs such as High bush blueberry (*Vaccinium corymbosum*) or Red chokeberry (*Aronia arbutifolia*). Our woods will thank you!

Farmington River, Riverbank Stabilization Project

The Town of Simsbury has begun work to stabilize the bank of the Farmington River in the area of Mathers Crossing and Riverview Court. This project is designed to prevent further erosion of the bank and protect the 30 inch sanitary sewer that runs adjacent to the river. Black and Warner Construction Co. from Unionville, CT has been engaged to complete the work which began the week of October 17, 2016.

In order to access the project area, construction vehicles will be required to cross the Greenway (*Farmington River Heritage Trail*) in the area of the Weatogue commuter lot and behind Mitchell Auto Group. Signs will be posted to alert trail users.

Election Day November 8th

Election Day is November 8th! Visit the Town of Simsbury's Registrar of Voters page to find out everything you need to know about registering to vote; changing your name, address or party affiliation; obtaining an absentee ballot; deadlines and polling locations.

Please note that all mail-in and in-person voter registration applications must be **received or post-marked by Tuesday, November 1, 2016 by 8:00 p.m.** in order to be accepted for the November 8, 2016 election. Election Day Registration Voters: If you are not already registered to vote, you may appear in person at the Registrar of Voters' office on Election Day, register, and cast a vote by Election Day Registration (EDR) ballot.

Please be aware that the Registrars must contact applicants' previous municipalities to confirm that new applicants have not already voted elsewhere before issuing a ballot. Allow sufficient time to cast your ballot by 8:00 p.m.

Revaluation of Real Estate in Simsbury

In accordance with State law and in order to make sure residents are taxed on the fair value of their properties, revaluation of all real estate in Simsbury is now underway. Over the next 18 months each property in town will be reassessed in-line with current market values. You may see town employees and contractors from *Municipal Valuation Services* assisting with this process.

The first phase is a pre-review which includes comparisons between what is actually observed at the property and what is shown on the assessor's card. The next phase beginning in December includes property questionnaires, updating records for work done under building permits, inspection of recently sold properties and valuation. Revaluation notices culminate the process and are expected to be mailed to taxpayers in December 2017. Under Construction in Simsbury

Green Tea Chinese Restaurant, located at 570 Hopmeadow Street is undergoing significant renovations, and will re-open with a new name and a new Asian-fusion style menu. Looking forward to the re-opening mid-November! Their new name will be *Table 570 Asian Fusion*.

Benny's located at 562 Hopmeadow Street is undergoing a new dining room expansion, package store improvements, and parking and landscape improvements. They will remain open during construction. <http://bennysofsimsbury.com/>

Garden Homes on the south side of town along Hopmeadow Street is now under construction – building foundations have been completed and framing has started. This development was approved for 181 residential rental units, including townhomes and apartment style housing.

Commercial and retail units were also approved as part of the Planned Area Development (PAD), but zoning and specific site plan approvals have yet to be sought and therefore only the residential component is under construction at this time. Highcroft: 272 residential rental units off Powder Forest Drive are also under construction by Landworks Development/Nelson Construction team. The project includes *Highcroft Apartment Homes* with 224 apartment units and *Highcroft Townhomes* with 48 units. Move-ins commenced in July 2016 and construction is expected to conclude on the first 128 unit phase in late spring 2017. Berkshire Bank: At the Corner of Bushy Hill and Albany Turnpike, Berkshire Bank is waiting on interior fit-out and is not yet open.

Permitted

Big Y has indicated that they have delayed a start date in Simsbury for at least a year and possibly into 2018 based on internal financial priorities and commitments elsewhere, but will begin removal of the buildings on their property. Big Y further indicated that they are still interested in Simsbury and confirmed that they have all their town and state permits in place for when they do begin.

Hoskins Road Workforce Overlay Zone (WHOZ): The Town planning boards have approved 88 residential units for the property with twenty percent affordable housing. Although the project has been approved there is currently no activity.

Chestnut Hills: Located on the corner of Drake Hill and Hopmeadow Street, 46 unit apartments have been approved for the historical building and the surrounding property. This property is currently for sale.

On the Horizon

The Silverman Group: Simsbury's Planning Department has been advised that The Silverman Group continues to press forward on their plans to develop/redevelop the site located at 200 Hopmeadow Street (formerly The Hartford). The property underwent a Charrette planning process and is currently zoned for residential, commercial and retail. The demolition of the original Hartford building is complete. Preliminary plans were presented to the Zoning Commission on September 19th. Initial concept plans have been presented to Design Review, Planning and Zoning for a multifamily residential community.
