FY 2024/2025 Budget Process

Last night, the Board of Finance passed the budget, resulting in 4.68% tax increase. The impact to a home at around the \$400,00 market value will see an increase of \$408 per year. The mill rate, including the Fire District is moving from 31.82 (1.00 Fire), to 33.31 (1.05 Fire). Detailed information on the Budget can be found at this link where you find the progression of the budget from the Town Manager, through the BOE, to the BOS, who passed it along to the BOF for final approval.

The Board of Selectmen will hold a special meeting tomorrow, 4/18, via zoom, at 9:30am to set the referendum date and approve the budget mailer. The planned date for the Budget Referendum is *May 10th at Town Hall*, with instructions to follow for parking, etc. Absentee Ballots will be available for the Budget Referendum but must be picked up in person at the Town Clerk's Office. There is no early voting for the referendum.

Clarification on Flower Bridge Appropriations, Approvals

At last night's BOF Public Hearing, there was discussion on the cost of work needed to be done on the Flower Bridge. The item in the CIP – Capital Improvement Plan – shows the following.

Old Drake Hill Road Flower Bridge Rehabilitation – Supplemental (Bonds \$495,000; Prior Authorizations \$2,764,000 \$2,269,000)

What was missing from last night's discussion was that the previous BOS voted to approve funding on this project twice, as shown in the Prior Authorization above. In 2022/2023, when we received the American Rescue Plan Act during the pandemic, we allocated \$300K to do the evaluation and study to bring the bridge up to its needed level of maintenance. In year 2023/2024, we approved an additional use of ARPA dollars for the estimated cost of the project at \$1.9M, making it a priority. During ARPA, we sought input from residents, many of whom came and spoke to the importance of the Flower Bridge. As you'll recall, these funds were intended to benefit the community as a whole, and also to remediate the impact of the pandemic. The Flower Bridge was a good fit, as it was a place for people to enjoy the outdoors, and to also stimulate the economy, which it did by drawing people to Simsbury.

The \$495K is due to finding additional work, critical to the bridge, found when the project was being finalized. As shown above, most of the cost of the project has already been approved and designated – and also voted on in last year's budget.

DEPARTMENT NEWS & NOTES

Police Department:

The Police Department has hired Mario Mairana (pronounced Mayor-ana) as the town's newest police officer after approval from the Police Commission at their regular meeting held on April 8, 2024. Mario joins the department after a 17-year career in the banking industry. He begins employment on April 17th and the 6-month police academy starts later this month. Town Manager's Office:

After a competitive RFP for our Labor, Employment, and Pension Counsel; FordHarrison was selected to continue to serve as the Town's Labor, Employment, and Pension Counsel.
