## **Planning Department**

• The Zoning Commission approved a text amendment on behalf of McLean at their June 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting. The text amendment was required as part of the development of a new 74 unit independent living building within the existing campus.

- 200 Hopmeadow Street (former Hartford property): The project includes 282 rental units (about half have been permitted so far), a 120 bed assisted living facility, and 11 thousand square feet of commercial space. All of the development is on the north side of the property. The south side, where the former Hartford building was located, has no development at this time. Construction is underway and the assisted living facility is expected to be open by August.
- Planning Director Mike Glidden recently shared an update with the Economic Development Commission, summarizing key projects around town that are either planned or underway. It has the latest update on projects we frequently receive questions about including the former Hartford property, Powder Forest, and the Big Y parcel. ### **Tobacco Valley Solar**

Construction is underway on the Tobacco Valley Solar development on the north side of town off of Hoskins and County Roads. Construction is expected to wrap up in mid-October. I recognize how disruptive the construction process is for residents who live in the area. One of the most important things

we can do is keep the lines of communication open through the summer. Anyone with concerns can always reach out to me or to Aaron Svedlow, the project's development manager (aaron@nleservices.com).

I'm told that the next 5 to 6 weeks will be the most disruptive from a noise standpoint due to the pounding of pilings into the soil. Toward the end of July/early August, the noise level is expected to be significantly reduced as the panels are installed on the stands.

At our May 29<sup>th</sup> Board of Selectman meeting, Planning Director Mike Glidden and town engineer Jeff Shea shared a presentation on the Tobacco Valley Solar Project, the 26 Megawatt solar installation. You can access a link to that presentation <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a>.

The Board of Education has engaged a consulting firm on a Facilities Master Plan to develop a roadmap to address concerns around aging buildings and student capacity. On June 5<sup>th</sup>, the District held a public hearing and information session to solicit feedback and share some initial findings around enrollment projections and building conditions. This month the town is beginning work on a new park next to the Flower Bridge. It will include new landscaping, paver walkways, and a new pavilion. This project will also improve access to the river for the launching of kayaks. While this park will enhance an already amazing attraction, the town will unfortunately need to close the Flower Bridge for much of the 2019 season.

### **BOARD OF SELECTMEN BUSINESS:**

Economic Development: One of the four focus areas identified by the Board of Selectmen for the new Economic Development Commission (EDC) is business recruitment, retention and outreach. As part of that initiative, the EDC recently piloted a business roundtable event on June 12<sup>th</sup>. The purpose of the roundtable is to discuss challenges facing local business owners, better understand the issues that are important to them, and learn how we as a town can better support our business community. Approximately 25 business owners, Town staff, and members of the EDC gathered at Westminster School to engage in open dialogue on what is working well, identify areas of concern, and discuss the changes that need to be made in order for businesses to grow and prosper in Simsbury. From signage regulations to parking and traffic control, the group discussed the challenges facing current business owners and those seeking to open businesses here in Town. The EDC will use the feedback collected at the roundtables to make recommendations on existing policies, creating incentives and providing business resources. Approximately 25-30 businesses will be invited to each quarterly event on a rotating basis; the next roundtable will take place in September.

Naming of the New Park at 1 Old Bridge Road: If you have a name you would like to suggest for the new Park being constructed at 1 Old Bridge Road, please go to our website and complete the proposal form. The Town Manager's Office is currently accepting suggestions through 7:00pm on July 15<sup>th</sup>. The 1 Old Bridge Road Park Naming Rights Committee is scheduled to meet in late July to review the suggestions and prepare a recommendation that will be forwarded to the Board of Selectmen at a meeting later this summer or early fall. Please contact the Town Manager's Office if you have any questions.

**Open Space Advisory Duties:** The Open Space Committee has established a work group to aid in updating our open space acquisition guidelines (first update since the late 1990's), creating a stewardship policy, recommending land management policies/practices, and updating our agricultural leases. The work group kicked-off this project today. The work group will primarily be staffed by the Culture, Parks and Recreation Department and the Planning Department.

## **DEPARTMENTAL NEWS & NOTES**

**Library:** Beginning July 1, Simsbury Public Library will begin a one year fine free pilot. Overdue materials borrowed from Simsbury Library will not be assessed fines. This initiative is being undertaken to remove the barrier of fines and increase access to the Library's materials and services. For those wishing to contribute to the Library financially, there will be Library Support Jars available at both checkout desks for this purpose. Fines will continue to be assessed for high demand items such as museum passes, pronto books and the Library of Things. Users will also still be responsible for the cost of lost or damaged items.

**Planning:** FEMA has contacted the Town regarding engineering models associated with flood insurance rate map updates (see attached correspondence). The new maps and flood insurance study have not been completed. Planning Staff will monitor the progress on this project.
