#### **Planning Department**

- The Planning Commission approved, pursuant to a judge's order, the affordable housing application involving the subdivision of 80 Climax Road. This application was remanded by the Court back to Commission to hear more information specific to the drainage design and function associated with the 19 lot development.
- 200 Hopmeadow Street (former Hartford property): The project includes 282 rental units (about half have been permitted so far), a 120 bed assisted living facility, and 11 thousand square feet of commercial space. All of the development is on the north side of the property. The south side, where the former Hartford building was located, has no development at this time. Construction is underway and the assisted living facility is expected to be open by August. Construction is proceeding on 124 out of the 282 rental units. Work has started on the sidewalk along Hopmeadow Street that will connect the project to the Bike Trail via Latimer Lane.
- Planning Director Mike Glidden recently shared an update with the Economic Development Commission, summarizing key projects around town that are either planned or underway. It has the latest update on projects we frequently receive questions about including the former Hartford property, Powder Forest, and the Big Y parcel. You can find the full PowerPoint <u>here</u>.

#### Ensign Bickford Expanding Simsbury Workforce

I am pleased to share that The Ensign Bickford Aerospace and Defense Company is significantly expanding its Simsbury operation. The company is planning to create a center of excellence for electronic design and manufacturing for its Aerospace and Defense products. It plans on making over \$10M dollars of investment over the next 5 to 10 years and adding over 140 new jobs over the next 3 years right here in our community. Ensign Bickford has been the corner stone of Simsbury for the last 183 years and this investment helps to cement its future in Simsbury for many years to come.

Thank you EBAD for recognizing that Simsbury is a great place to expand a business, to the Simsbury Main Street Partnership, to our awesome town staff, and to the Board of Selectmen for working so hard to make this possible.

The response I have received from the community has been overwhelmingly positive and I thank the Board of Selectmen for their unanimous endorsement of my proclamation declaring June LGBTQ Month in Simsbury.

## Simsbury Public Library Fine Free Initiative

The Simsbury Public Library is conducting a pilot program for one year which eliminates fines on all but the most popular items. Instead, people with overdue materials will be encouraged to contribute to a voluntary donation jar. In eliminating fines, Simsbury joins a growing number of libraries across the country. The primary goal is to ensure all members of our community have access to our library's resources. Our research shows that other libraries that have gone fine free see an increase in circulation and no significant change in how quickly items get returned. We're going to monitor for a year and evaluate whether to continue.

#### **Tobacco Valley Solar**

Construction is underway on the Tobacco Valley Solar development on the north side of town off of Hoskins and County Roads. Construction is expected to wrap up in mid-October. I recognize how disruptive the construction process is for residents who live in the area. One of the most important things we can do is keep the lines of communication open through the summer. I'm told that the next 4 weeks will be the most disruptive from a noise standpoint due to the pounding of pilings into the soil. Toward the end of July/early August, the noise level is expected to be significantly reduced as the panels are installed on the stands.

At our May 29<sup>th</sup> Board of Selectman meeting, Planning Director Mike Glidden and town engineer Jeff Shea shared a presentation on the Tobacco Valley Solar Project, the 26 Megawatt solar installation. You can access a link to that presentation <u>here</u>.

## School News

The Board of Education has engaged a consulting firm on a Facilities Master Plan to develop a roadmap to address concerns around aging buildings and student capacity. On June 5<sup>th</sup>, the District held a public hearing and information session to solicit feedback and share some initial findings around enrollment projections and building conditions. ### **New Park Construction**

The Town has begun work on a new park next to the Flower Bridge. It will include new landscaping, paver walkways, and a new pavilion. This project will also improve access to the river for the launching of kayaks. While this park will enhance an already amazing attraction, the town will unfortunately need to close the Flower Bridge for much of the 2019 season.

# **DEPARTMENTAL NEWS & NOTES**

*Culture, Parks, and Recreation:* The Parks and Open Space Master Plan is underway. The intent of this master plan is to identify our community's park, recreation and open space needs so we can proactively plan for the future. The master planning process includes numerous community engagement opportunities. Focus groups will be conducted July 24-26; participants will be asked a variety of questions to assess customer satisfaction, parks, recreation and open space needs of the community, and issues that should be addressed in the comprehensive plan. A public information session is planned for Thursday, July 25<sup>th</sup> from 7:00-9:00PM at Sejong Lecture Hall, on the Westminster School campus. Additional engagement opportunities such as an online survey and another public information session will occur this fall.

*Town Manager's Office:* On June 13, 2019, our Deputy Town Manager attended the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving's orientation for the new Greater Together Community Funds program. The Community Funds were created as a result of the listening tours that the Foundation held during the winter of 2018-2019; click <u>here</u> to view the video of Simsbury's stop on the listening tour. Through the Community Funds, each town served by the Foundation will receive \$100,000 – half of the money will be available for immediate use, and the other half will be endowed. A percentage of the endowed funds will create a grant-making process to ensure that the funds have the greatest impact on the community. While the Foundation envisions local officials being involved in the process, the Board of Selectmen will not serve as the appointing authority and elected officials will not be eligible to serve on the committee. In addition, the Town will have no fiduciary or administrative role in the grant-making process. The Foundation will host regional meetings in the fall to further discuss the process for forming the advisory committees.
