- Today as of this meeting on January 8<sup>th</sup> the Connecticut House and Senate voted overwhelmingly to restore cuts that had been made to the Medicare Savings program. Governor Malloy has promised a veto because of where the money came from to reverse these cuts. There are people in our community who rely on this program, so it's something we continue to watch closely.
- On January 17<sup>th</sup> I'll be hosting a coffee and meet and greet at the Senior Center from 1-2 in the afternoon.

# Car Break-Ins

To date, there have been 15 cars stolen in Simsbury in 2017 (up from 7 in 2016). Each of these cars was unlocked and the keys were left in the car or otherwise accessible. Additionally, over 60 cars were entered into during the year and items stolen from inside (gift cards, cash, credit cards, etc.). These vehicles were also unlocked. Most of these car thefts have been in the southern part of town during the overnight hours, but the entire town has experienced some of the thefts. The Simsbury Police Department has been working to identify those responsible for the thefts and to prevent any further thefts. The number one way to prevent these thefts is to always lock your car and do not leave the keys accessible. Every car stolen in town was unlocked and the keys were accessible. Every car that was unlawfully entered into was unlocked.

### WHAT YOU CAN DO

Lock you cars.

Do not leave keys/fobs in your car.

Do not hide/leave holiday gifts or items of value in your car.

Call the police immediately if you see any suspicious activity.

Use motion sensors in your driveway.

Use car alarm systems.

# **ACHIEVEMENTS**

<u>Connecticut Interlocal Risk Management Agency (CIRMA)</u>: We were just informed today that the Town of Simsbury Department of Public Works was awarded the 2018 CIRMA Excellence Risk Management Award. The Department of Public Works was one of four CIRMA members that was selected to be awarded the award, under the category of 'New and Innovative Risk Management Initiatives'. The award includes a \$2,500 risk management grant. The Department of Public Works will be honored at CIRMA's annual meeting, which will be held on January 26, 2018. A formal press release recognizing the Department of Public Works' achievements will be provided.

## WINTER BUDGET STATUS

We've had 19 winter snow and ice events so far and we've expended about 40% of our total winter budget (salt and labor only).

### RETIREMENTS/RECRUITMENTS

<u>Chief of Police</u>: Chief of Police Peter Ingvertsen has informed the Town that he will be retiring on March 1st, after 18 years serving the Town of Simsbury in this role. Under the Chief's command, the Simsbury Police Department has truly become a model agency for professionalism and community policing, and earned federal accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, known as CALEA. I will personally miss his professionalism and leadership, but also his great sense of humor and we wish him all the best in his retirement. The Town Manager's Office will be working with the Police Commission on an interim plan and the recruitment process.

### UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Aspen Green (formerly referred to as Garden Homes) on the south side of town along Hopmeadow Street is now under construction with some units occupied. This development was approved for 181 residential rental units, including townhomes and apartment style housing. Commercial and retail units were also approved as part of the Planned Area Development (PAD). <u>Highcroft</u>: 272 Rental residences off Powder Forest Drive with 224 apartments and 48 townhomes by the Landworks Development / Nelson Construction team. Phase 1 (128 apartments) is already leased-up and Phase 2 (96 apartments) is under construction with first move-ins expected Spring

<u>Cambridge Crossing</u>: The Town planning boards have approved 88 residential units for the property along Hoskins Road with twenty percent affordable housing. The applicant has broken ground on the project. It is anticipated construction will continue over the next year.

<u>Berkshire Bank</u>: At the Corner of Bushy Hill and Albany Turnpike, Berkshire Bank has started their interior renovations. The Zoning Commission recently approved signage for the tenant. They hope to be open by the end of December.

## **PERMITTED**

 $\underline{Big\ Y}$  reaffirmed in July 2017 that they have delayed a start date in Simsbury indefinitely based on internal financial priorities and commitments elsewhere. Big Y further indicated that they are still interested in Simsbury and confirmed that they have all their town and state permits in place for when they do begin.

<u>Dunkin Donuts</u>: Great American Donut Inc. of East Plainville, CT received approval to construct a new Dunkin Donuts store at 1225 Hopmeadow Street currently owned by Antonio's LLS. Construction was approved on September 18, 2017.

<u>The Ensign House</u>: Located on the corner of Drake Hill and Hopmeadow Street, this property was recently sold to Mark and Ieke Scully, with the goals of preserving "the stone mansion, turning it into residential apartments and building additional net zero residential units on the property."

### *The Silverman Group*:

On May 3, 2017, the Town's Zoning Commission approved an application by Silverman SL for an approval under the Hartford-Simsbury Form Based Code. The project permits the construction of a 120 bed assisted living facility (146,100 sq. ft.), 280 units of luxury rental housing (156 units in stacked flats and 124 units in town homes), a community center and 11,600 square feet of retail/office space in a Traditional Neighborhood Design (TND) setting. This application was the second part of the Hartford-Simsbury Form Based Code permitting process. The developer broke ground in mid-September.
