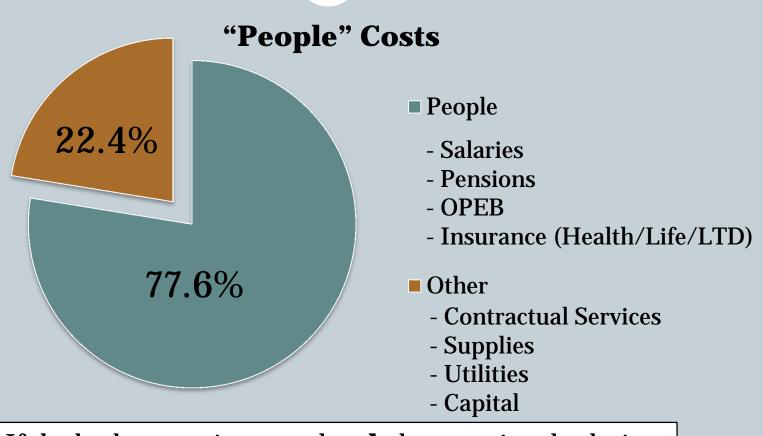

If the budget was increased <u>only</u> by negotiated salaries, the total budget would have to increase by <u>1.88%</u>.

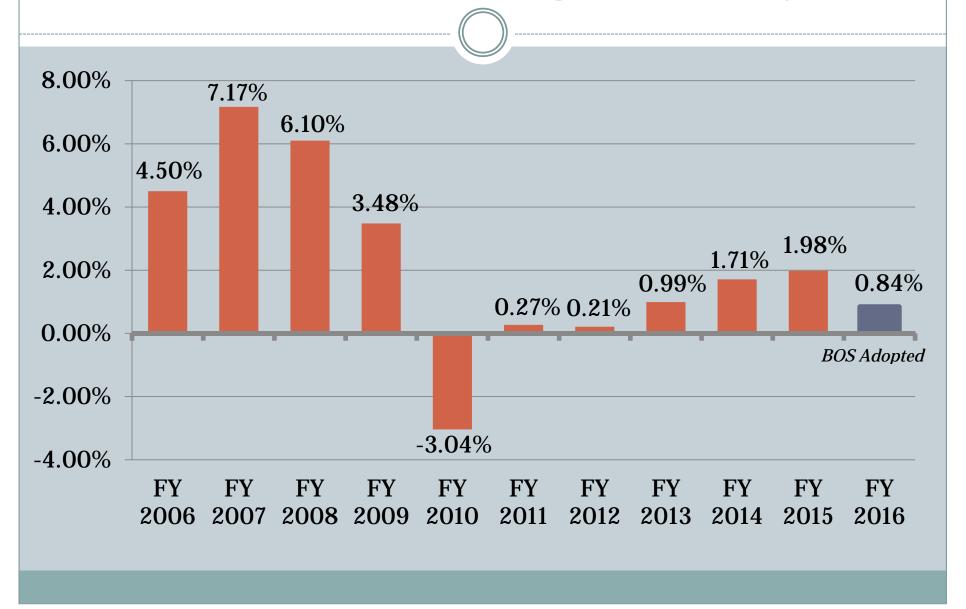

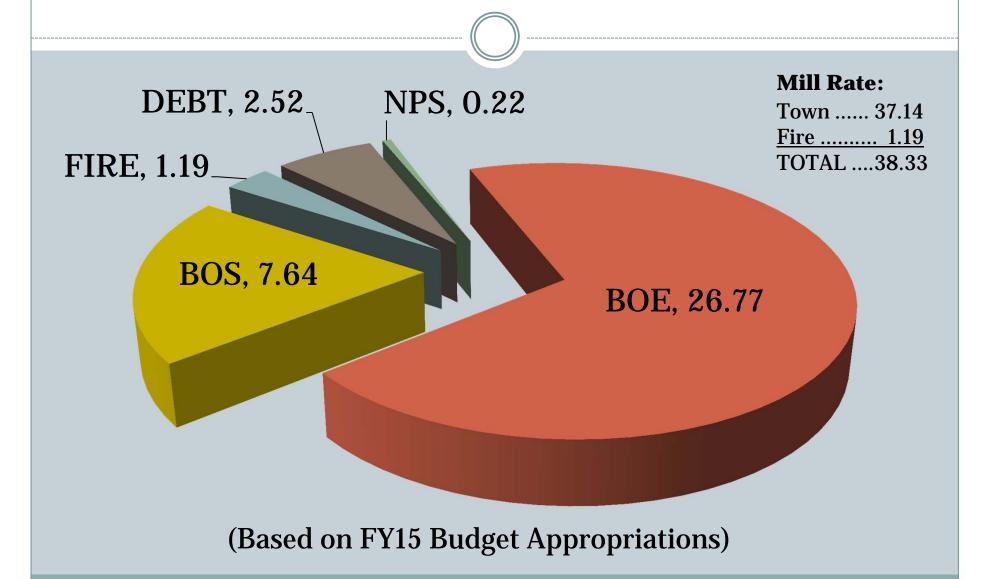

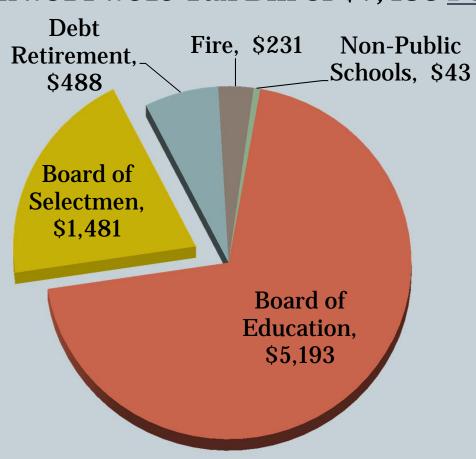

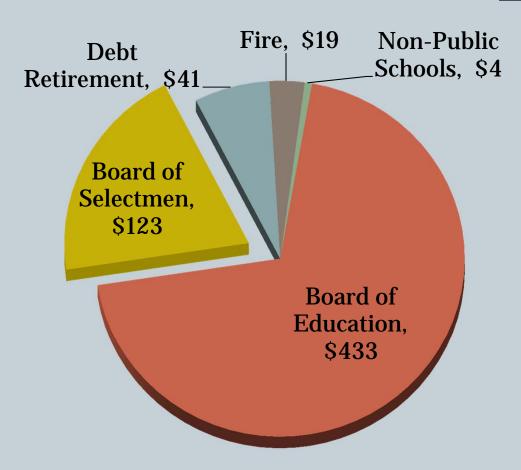
Where Do Your Tax Dollars Go?

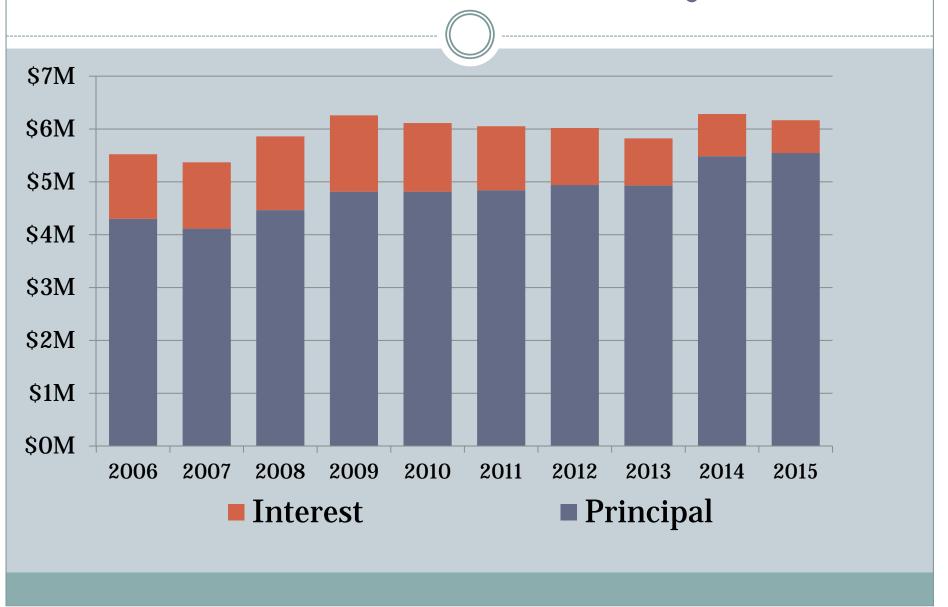
