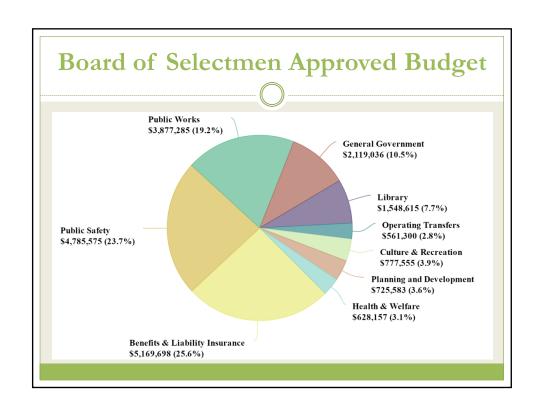
Board of Selectmen Approved Budget

The FY 17-18 BOS Approved Budget is

- **\$ 20,192,804**

- ×3.60% over last year's Town Budget
- ×0.75% over total Town/BOE Budget
- **★**\$4.26 per month for median taxpayer (Including savings from Capital/Debt Service reduction)

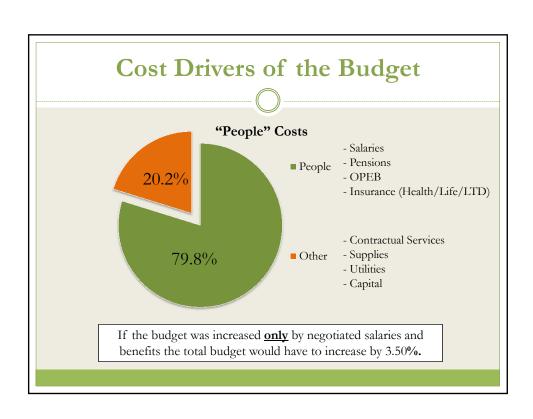
Governor's Proposed Budget

Savings in Employee Benefits

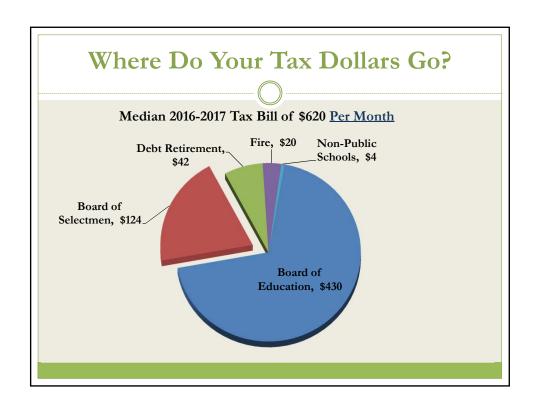
- Made additional payments to pension and other post-employment benefit (OPEB) funds to reduce the Annually Required Contribution (ARC) payment in the operating budgets.
- Closure of pension plans to new hires in two unions will lead to greater fiscal stability in the future.
- Health care consolidations.
- Through the Town's collective bargaining process Town employees
 have helped offset increased costs by agreeing to increased pension
 and OPEB fund contributions and increased healthcare copayments. Thank you to Town staff for this and for all they do for the people
 of Simsbury.

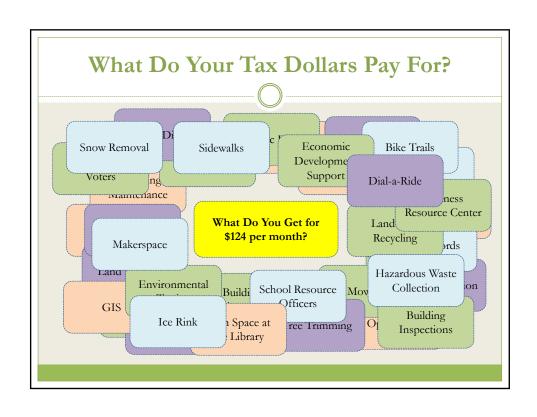
Additional Savings

- Print/copy management at the Library to save money.
- Police used asset forfeiture funds to pay for bulletproof vests.
- eRecordings under the Town Clerk to improve service/reduce costs.
- Town building energy upgrades.
- Use of Cloud technology to reduce hardware costs.
- Purchase of street lamps and conversion to LED lighting to reduce electricity costs.
- Refinancing of capital bonds.
- Equipment upgrades at Public Works for electricity savings and for controls on salt spreaders to reduce waste.

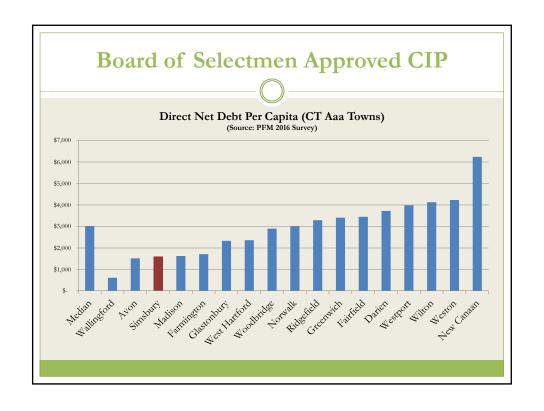

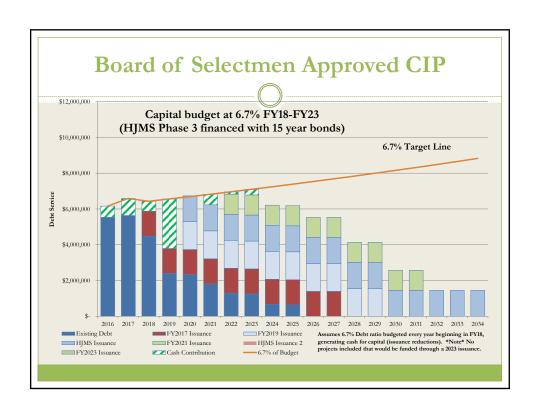
