The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced the start of the 90-day appeal period, which will begin on February 28, 2024 for the Farmington River watershed flood mapping project for Hartford County.

Preliminary flood insurance rate maps (FIRM) and a flood insurance study (FIS) were previously released to the Town of Simsbury and letters were mailed to alert owners with properties in flood zones. To determine if your property is within a preliminary flood zone, please go to the FEMA Map Service Center website <u>https://msc.fema.gov</u> and type in your address (including town and state).

This appeal period is an opportunity for the municipality or any property owners to challenge the FIRM & FIS by providing additional scientific or technical data to FEMA. An **appeal** is a formal written objection to a new or revised base flood elevation (BFE), flood zone, or floodway. An appeal must be supported by an analysis or scientific evidence showing that the information on the preliminary FIRM or FIS is scientifically or technically incorrect.

After the appeal period ends, FEMA will evaluate the data received and revise the preliminary FIRM and FIS if appropriate. Once all appeals are resolved, FEMA will send an appeal resolution letter to the community and all appellants.
